Summer Reading Challenge 2023





The **Summer Reading Challenge**, presented by The Reading Agency, delivered in partnership with public libraries and funded by Arts Council England is the UK's biggest reading for pleasure programme for **children aged 4 to 11**. The Challenge encourages children to enjoy the benefits of reading for pleasure over the summer holidays, providing lots of fun as well as helping to prevent the summer reading 'dip'. 1 in 5 children cannot read well by the age of 11 which hugely limits their life choices and skills.

Each year the Challenge motivates **over 700,000** children to keep reading to build their skills and confidence and last year, **in Haringey, 1,736 children** joined the Challenge.

This year's Summer Reading Challenge theme – Ready, Set, Read! – has been created in partnership with Youth Sport Trust and illustrated by the brilliant children's writer and illustrator Loretta Schauer. This year's sport and play themed initiative aims to keep children's minds and bodies active over the summer break, empowering young people to forge new connections with others. The Challenge and the accompanying book collection shows that imagination and play can unlock endless possibilities, and that the library is where this starts.

The Challenge will officially begin on the **8th July** in England and Wales.

You can join the Challenge at your local library and take part for free. The library will give you a special collector folder, stickers, and other special incentives, and help you find books to read for your Challenge.







The Summer Reading Challenge shines a light on the power of public libraries as **a hub for local communities** and will bring together the benefits of sport, play and creativity.

The Youth Sport Trust has developed fun family activity cards, which alongside the official 2023 Summer Reading Challenge book collection, will aim to keep imaginations moving over the school holidays. The Challenge and activity cards are available to access through the online digital platform (summerreadingchallenge.org.uk) to allow those with limited physical access to a library to join in.

By participating in the challenge, young people will have the opportunity to explore new reading material, develop skills, and discover new interests.

The Summer Reading Challenge:

- Significantly improves reading confidence and independence
- Ensures pupils are ready for their return to school, preventing the summer reading 'dip'
- Aids the successful transition between year groups and key stages
- Contributes to all pupils' achievement
- Encourages extra-curricular activity encouraging family engagement with reading
- Develops links between your school, the library and the wider community

For children who took part in 2022:

- 77% read more over the summer holidays
- 75% improved their reading skills
- 71% felt more confident about their reading

How it works:

- Children sign up through their local library and receive a collector folder.
- They set a reading goal and borrow books of their choice during the summer, collecting special stickers and incentives.
- Library staff and volunteers help children to discover new books that suit their interests and reading level and run a programme of free themed activities in the library.
- Children who complete the Challenge are presented with a certificate and a medal.

The yoto Carnegies

The UK's longest running and best-loved book awards for children and young people, The Yoto Carnegies, have announced their 2023 shortlists.

The Yoto Carnegie Medal for Writing is awarded annually to a children's book author whose writing creates an outstanding reading experience. It was established in 1936 in memory of the Scottish-born philanthropist, Andrew Carnegie (1835-1919). This year, the Medal for Writing sees an all-female shortlist dominated by YA fiction, featuring first time shortlistings for critically acclaimed authors Jessie Burton, Patrice Lawrence, Sita Brahmachari and Manon Steffan Ros.

Strength of voice and originality of narrative style is celebrated, with many of the stories portraying inspirational characters or figures from real life overcoming adversity and finding strength in community and personal relationships.

The Yoto Carnegie Medal for Illustration, established in 1955, is awarded annually to a children's book illustrator whose artwork creates an outstanding reading experience. This year's shortlist features a diverse and bold range of illustrative and artistic styles, from a manga-inspired graphic novel, to traditional Chinese paper-cutting, from sharp, simple ink drawings to expansive watercolours.

The Yoto Carnegies celebrate outstanding achievement in children's writing and illustration and are unique in being judged by children's and youth librarians, with the respective Shadowers' Choice Medals voted for by children and young people.






NEXT READS:AMAZING BOOKS TO ENJOY THIS SUMMER!

'Arthur Who Wrote Sherlock' by Linda Bailey, illus. Isabelle Follath

A lovely narrative story about the life of Arthur Conan Doyle and his creation Sherlock Holmes. This beautifully illustrated biography would sit well in early non-fiction collections.





'Swift' by Lorna Hill

Did you know that swifts can fly up to 111 kilometres an hour and they can eat 10,000 insects a day? Follow the incredible story of the swift's migratory journey from Britain to Africa in this wonderful book.

'Molly, Olive & Dexter' by Catherine Rayner

Meet Molly the hare, Olive the owl and Dexter the fox cub, in Catherine Rayner's latest picture book. The young friends are learning how to play with each other and how important it is to collaborate and use everyone's strengths. This title has been chosen for this year's Summer Reading Challenge – 'Ready, Steady, Read!' and can highlight the importance of early years play.





'My Baba's Garden' by Jordan Scott, illus. Sydney Smith

The precious time that is spent between a grandson and his grandmother is lovingly depicted in Jordan's moving story and re-created in award-winning Sydney's illustrations. A welcome addition to any story corner and Nature collection.

'The Song Walker' by Zillah Bethell

It is always great to see (and read) a story set in a different country (Australia) and with indigenous First Peoples (Aborigines)! In Zillah Bethell's latest pacy story, you get to be immersed in the Australian outback and to realise how important the culture of the ancestors is to everyday life. This is a powerful story about the meeting of two cultures and how the bonds of friendship can be fractured, but how ultimately, with respect and understanding, the bonds can last a lifetime.







'The Rescue of Ravenwood' by Natasha Farrant

What would you do if your rambling family estate, overlooking the sea, and home to many animals, was under attack? This is the dilemma faced by Bea and Raffy, but as children, what agency do they have? A well-constructed narrative about the importance of place, as well as what makes a family, will make this an engrossing read for 8 years and above.

'The Swifts' by Beth Lincoln, illus. Claire Powell

An amazing debut by Beth Lincoln, sees the Swift family trying to solve the murder of Aunt Schadenfreude. Shenanigan, Felicity and Phenomenon – are sisters, named – as tradition has it – by the family dictionary! If you love the sound of words, rolling them on your tongue, the gothic and quite frankly absurd – this will make a great read-aloud in the classroom! Recommended!



'Once There Was' by Kiyash Monsef



Some more great debuts: don't be put off by the cover – it contains an incredible story based on Persian myths! Marjan's father always used to tell her the most amazing bedtime stories when she was young, little realising that they would help her in the future. When he dies, she is left his veterinary clinic, but when a call from a mysterious organisation asks her to go to a secret location in England, she is intrigued and finds herself meeting a mythical griffon and the family it belongs to. Suffice it to say, it is not an easy life, and when 2 teenagers come face-to-face with the origin of the world – The Unicorn- they realise they are in above their heads! A fabulous read for 11+

'Greenwild: The World Behind the Door' by Pari Thomson

An eco-thriller, by new Iranian-British author Pari Thomson, sees a parallel world inside Kew Gardens and how massive corporations are out to exploit it's natural resources. Daisy wants to find out where her Botanist mother has disappeared to and if its connected with other missing scientists and with the help of a dandelion torch and a cat with attitude, she sets out on her perilous adventure.









'The Wolf-Girl, the Greeks and the Gods' by Tom Holland, illus. Jason Cockcroft

We Were Wolves' and 'Running With Horses'.






'Human 2.0' by Patrick Kane, illus. Sam Rodriguez

Human 2.0 by Patrick Kane (who was the youngest person to receive a bionic limb at the age of 16) shows how far medical science has come from the 3,000 Egyptian toe to the prosthetics used by athletes!



A collection of poems and stories from the nation's favourite storyteller, Michael Morpurgo and fully illustrated by Yuval Zommer (whose 'Big Book 'series is popular in libraries). Lovely to read aloud.



'Hedy Lamarr's Double Life: Hollywood Legend and Brilliant Inventor' by Laurie Wallmark, illus. Katie Wu



Hedy Lamarr was daubed 'The Most Beautiful Woman in the World 'by Hollywood, but she also was a fantastic inventor. Did you know that the computers and mobile phones you use today have frequencies that Hedy invented? Because of her invention she saved countless thousands of lives in the Second World War, but had to keep it all a secret! It's good to highlight female inventors and engineers and encourage girls in STEAM technologies!

Also on offer to Early Years & Families Free Books and Fun Activities

Throughout the year we celebrate books and featured authors with themed displays such as Elmer Day and Roald Dahl Story Day. We also have free book giveaways including World Book Day (World Book Night for adults too!).

All children's books borrowed on children's library cards are fine free - no fees are

payable if returned late!

Bookstart Baby is a universal book gifting programme in England and Wales. Every child aged 0-12 months is eligible for a free pack including a book, information leaflet and finger puppet, designed to support and encourage families to read with their child as early as possible.

Every baby is eligible for a free Bookstart Baby pack, which contains:

- An engaging book carefully chosen by independent panel of experts such as health visitors and librarians
- A colourful finger puppet
- A fun and informative concertina leaflet for parents and carers about the benefits of sharing rhymes and stories with babies from an early age.

Additional books in other languages are available for EAL families and parental guidance is also available to download and print in over 20 languages. Bookstart packs are available in:

Albanian, Arabic, Bengali, Chinese (simplified), Dari, Farsi, French, German, Greek, Gujrati, Hindi, Hungarian, Italian, Kurdish, Pashto, Polish, Portuguese, Punjabi, Romanian, Russian, Somali, Spanish, Turkish, Ukrainian.

Included with library membership, you will get access to online resources such as:

- Overdrive and it's Libby app provide access to thousands of the latest e-books and eaudiobooks. Works on phones, tablets, computers and e-readers.
- Download e-editions of the daily newspapers and popular magazines to your tablet, phone or PC with Pressreader.
- Use Borrowbox to listen to eAudiobooks on your phone, tablet and PC.

If you are looking for something a little different, remember we have a huge selection of graphic novels, CDs, DVDs, audiobooks on CD and language courses.

Home Library Service

If you have problems getting to a Library, then the Home Library Service is for you. We can deliver a wide range of library materials to your home on an agreed day - returning every 4 weeks to collect any finished items and replace them with new lends.

This service is for Haringey residents who are unable to access the mainstream library service, either temporarily or long-term: those with limited mobility or who use mobility aids such as a walking frame or wheelchair; people who are blind or with a significant sight impairment; people who are deaf or with a significant hearing impairment; anyone unable to carry the books they require due to reduced mobility; anyone with mental health problems such as agoraphobia; people who have solecarer responsibilities.

We can also provide a rotating collection of reading materials for nurseries, day centres and residential units.
